

Dear St Thomas members and friends!

God provides

This is the last time that I am preparing a newsletter before our relocation to Pietermaritzburg in the week before Christmas. Accepting this call to Pietermaritzburg was on the one hand the most difficult decision I ever made. Two of our children are still at school, but more importantly I believe that St Thomas congregation needs pastoral continuity and stability. On the other hand, however, the decision to move was not my own, but prompted by my election as Bishop of the Free Evangelical Lutheran Synod in South Africa (FELSISA) and the need for the office of the bishop to be placed more centrally within Synod.

Having said that, I trust above all the providence of God. Indeed he has everything in his hands. That is true for my own family, but also for St Thomas congregation. Furthermore God's view is not restricted to the present, but extends into the distant future. He knows what is and will be needed tomorrow. And I am convinced that he has plans to prosper us and not harm us and to give us hope and a future (Jer.29:11). Therefore he "commands" us not to be discouraged, as he is always with us, wherever we go (Joshua 1:9).

After 8 years in St Thomas you will also be well aware of my shortcomings. With a new pastor comes new strengths, also a new personality. But all of us work in the kingdom of God and serve the one who calls us according to his master plan. Paul writes to the Corinthians: "I planted the seed. Apollos watered it. but God made it grow" (1 Cor.3:6). Likewise I will have had my role to play and Dr. Winterle will continue the work of God, possibly with a slightly revised role and a new purpose. But "you" (members of St Thomas) are also part of the "team". With every change comes a new challenge to step forward in faith. It is a time, not to be served (and to watch from the sidelines), but to serve the Lord with new vigour with the gifts he has given vou.

May I use this newsletter to convey my sincere thanks and deepest gratitude to the members of St Thomas for their friendship, support, prayers and encouragement in what has been an enriching time both for me personally and my family. You are all very special people, made special by the grace of God.

Overcome evil with good

So often when one experiences disappointments or things don't work out as expected, the "evil" causes a downward spiral leading of re-actions not so dissimilar to the "evil" experienced. Such "evils" are encountered in all facets of life, political, social, family, and church. Scripture refers to our evil reactions as "an eye for an eye" behaviour, deeply rooted in the "law". The unmerited experience of God's grace, however, leads to a truly "revolutionary" response: Evil is overcome with good!

God's act of goodness

The overcoming of evil by good God is "God's" response to the evilness in this world. The "law" should have prompted him to react in anger and to speak judgement. But instead God reacted with divine kindness. In Christ he left his thrown of judgement, entered this world, was exposed to it and suffered at the hands of human evilness, but never hit back. Instead he was silent like a "lamb being led to the slaughter" (Is.53:7b). He died. But in his death, bearing the punishment for our sins, the evilness of this world was overcome once and for all.

The journey started in Bethlehem, when the hosts of angels sang: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men, on whom his favour rest" (Lk.2:14) and ended on the cross of Calvary with the words: "It is finished" (Jn 19:30).

In is only against this background that the words of Paul in his letter to

the Romans can and should be read:

Therefore I urge you... in view of God's mercy to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God... Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world... Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in brotherly love... Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord... Bless those who persecute you... Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn. Live in harmony with one another... Do not repay evil for evil ... (and) do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good (Romans 12:1ff)

The highlighted verse is the watchword for 2011. In this world we will encounter evil, but let your response be Christ-driven.

We do not know what lies ahead in 2011. But we do know who leads the way. It is our loving Lord, whose humble birth we celebrate during the Christmas Season.

Wishing you all a very happy Christmas and blessed new year.

Sunday School Breakfast - 15 January 2011





at Home Affairs is that the application (together with many others) is receiving priority attention.

Needless to say, the delay is causing great uncertainty, preventing the Winterles from purchasing air tickets to South Africa and making concrete arrangements for their relocation.

Provisional plans are for the

Winterles to arrive in Cape Town in the first week of January 2011. Quinton Aubrey has agreed to fetch them from the air port. Dr Winterle's first Sunday service is already scheduled for 9 January and the installation service for Sunday 23 January.

Let us pray that everything goes according to plan. If for whatever reason the work permit should not be granted in time, vacancy arrangements will be made for that period (which hopefully shouldn't be long at all). I myself (Bishop Reinstorf) will most probably oversea the vacancy and take the necessary measures for St Thomas to be served well.

When the Winterles do arrive, make them feel at home. Although Pastor Dr. Winterle has often travelled

FROM THE TREASURER

This is the last report for the 2010 financial year and will deal with the situation as at 23 November 2010. Basically there is only one month left for this financial year. As not much is expected to happen on the financial front during December this provides with an ideal opportunity to assets our financial situation for the year.

Income shortfall

As stated in the previous newsletter, so far this year our expenses exceeded our income. Thanks to an increase in contributions (church offerings) during the latter half of the financial year, this shortfall has been reduced. Primarily due to a lack of rental income from our flat (less than anticipated due to problems with one of the lessees) and no bazaar income as budgeted, the shortfall is still approximately *R28 000*. To cover the shortfall we had to use some of the savings from previous years.

Expenses

As usual our major expense item was

our annual levy to Synod, which amounted to R152 743. We also spent some money on improving the toilet facilities at church and the floor in the courtyard at a cost of R28 359. The bathroom in the parsonage was tiled and renovated at a cost of R10 604. The other costs were the normal running expenses and they were all within the budgeted figures.

Church Offerings

The graph on the next page shows (in the first column) our budget for church offerings (or contributions). Until the last week of November they amounted to R127 195. Together with our special collection of R8 913, our total contributions were R136 108 as at the end of November (Sunday, 21 November). During October our

normal contributions recorded the highest monthly intake ever of R21 113.

Record contributions in October: R21 113

Due to the positive response to the appeal for contributions, as well as the special collection, the shortfall on contributions has declined from over R17 000 to about **R6 000**.


Thanks

Flower Duty

The person on duty is requested to make a (very simple) flower arrangement to be placed either on or next to the altar (the flowers are to be taken home afterwards).

Altar Duty

The person on duty is requested to fill the communion vessels and wafer plate and place them on the altar (and wash the vessels after the service).

Tea Duty

The person on duty is requested prepare the cups and sauces before the service, switch on the urn, serve coffee and tea after the service (provide milk), and wash the dishes.
